Ship Anchorage Specifications
Deep laden vessels (over 28' draft) normally anchor in the "B" or Diamond Island Roads anchorage. Light vessels, barges, and recreational boats may anchor in the "A" anchorage off Fish Point. Both anchorages lie in the inner harbor and are well-protected.

Tender Landing
The tender landing for ships at anchorages A and B is located at the Maine State Pier, there is a wooden dock secured by wood pilings. The landing is ADA accessible. The same amenities listed for the Maine State Pier apply to the tender landing.

Pilotage
Pilots board 1.0 nautical mile north of the ELN Racon "PAPA" buoy at position 43-31.6 North and 70-05.5 West.
Portland Pilots monitor VHF 16 and 11 and can be reached at Tel: (207) 774-5623.

Docking Information
All vessels operating in Portland Harbor must have a Pilot in board. Under recently instituted rules of the Portland Harbor Commissioners, Docking Master rates and procedures are regulated. All vessels requiring tug services in berthing are required to have a Docking Master onboard.

Freeport is a village rich with history, much of which is preserved for enjoyment today. Freeport was founded in 1789 and folklore credits Freeport as "the birthplace of Maine". It was at Jameson Tavern that meetings were held where colonists debated a separation from Massachusetts. Historical points include the Harrington House (1830), home of the Historical Society, exhibits and archives. Pettingill Farm is a 19th century salt water farm where visitors find exhibits of 19th century coastal farm life. The Gore House is the home of a truly unique McDonald's which visitors find extraordinary. The village center is a unique blend of world class retailers and specialty shops housed in carefully preserved historic properties. Points of interest include oceanfront grandeur of Wolf's Neck Woods State Park, Winslow Park, and Mast Landing Sanctuary with nature walks and guided tours; and there's Maine's natural phenomenon, the Desert of Maine.
